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Book of Exodus

Moses wrote the book of Exodus. The word "exodus" means going out. Exodus is about God's people, the Israelites, going out of Egypt.

Earlier this year we studied the book of Genesis. We learned about Adam and Eve, who lived in a beautiful garden. They disobeyed God and were forced to leave the garden. Years later, the earth was filled with sinful people, so God sent a great flood to cover the earth. Only Noah and his family and some animals were saved. Then God called Abraham to move to Canaan. Abraham had a son named Isaac. Isaac had two sons, Jacob and Esau. Jacob had 12 sons.

One of Jacob's sons, Joseph, became an important ruler in Egypt. Later, Jacob and his family moved to Egypt. The book of Exodus begins after Jacob's family had been in Egypt for several hundred years. Exodus 1:6-7 tells us about that. "Later, Joseph, his brothers, and all the people of that generation died. But the Israelites had many children, and their number grew until the country of Egypt was filled with them."

The book of Exodus is very special because it continues the story of God's love for all people. As we study Exodus, remember that God loves you, His promises always come true and He always wants what is best for you.

Pay Attention to God

When Joseph was a ruler in Egypt, all of his family came to live there, too. After many years, there were thousands of Israelites living in Egypt. But there was a new Pharaoh (king) in Egypt. This ruler did not know about Joseph and his family. Exodus 1:10 tells us about Pharaoh's plan for the Israelites. "We must make plans to stop them from growing stronger. If there is war, they might join our enemies, defeat us, and escape from the land!"

So Pharaoh punished the Israelites by making them slaves. He made life very hard for the Israelites. The slave masters forced the Israelites to build cities where Pharaoh could store grain. But the more the Egyptians forced the Israelites to work, the more children they had. This made the Egyptians more afraid of the Israelites. So the slave masters made the Israelites work even harder.

Pharaoh did not believe in the one true God. He did not treat God's people with kindness. Later, God punished Pharaoh and the entire nation of Egypt. This is a good lesson for us. We should pay attention to God and His Word, the Bible. Then we will know what we should do and how we can please God.

Will you pay attention to God's Word today?

Baby Moses

Yesterday we learned that God's people were slaves in Egypt. One Israelite man and his wife had a son named Moses. As soon as Moses was born, they hid him. Why? Because Pharaoh ordered that all the Israelite baby boys should be killed. He thought this would stop the Israelite nation from growing.

As Moses grew, it became more difficult for his mother to hide him. Moses' mother did not want her baby to die. Exodus 2:3 tells us what Moses' mother did next. "She hid him for as long as she could. Excuses

Common Things

It is interesting to read the Bible and see how God often used common things to accomplish His plan. God used David's sling to defeat a giant and a feeding box to be the bed for baby Jesus. God used a star to lead the wise men to Bethlehem and five small barley loaves and two fish to feed more than 5000 people.

God used Moses and his walking stick. And He can use you and the common things you have to bring praise and honor to Him. Ask God to use you and your possessions to reach out to people who need to know about Jesus.

Aaron

God chose Moses to lead the Israelites out of Egypt. But He did not send Moses alone. God also used Moses' brother, Aaron. Moses thought that he was not a good speaker. So God told Moses that Aaron would help him. In Exodus 4:15-16, God told Moses what he should do. "I will tell you what to say. Then you will tell Aaron, and I will help him say it well. I will tell both of you what to do. So Aaron will speak for you. Like God, you will speak to him, and he will tell the people what you say."

Aaron also served as a prophet with Moses. Later, after God led His people out of Egypt, Aaron helped Moses lead the Israelites. And God chose Aaron to be the first high priest.

Like Moses, Aaron was not perfect. He made some serious mistakes. One time he built a golden calf for the Israelites to worship. Another time Aaron and his sister, Miriam, challenged Moses' leadership. But Aaron repented of these things, and God forgave him. God let Aaron continue to serve as the high priest until he died.

God knows that it is hard for us to do His work alone. That's when He provides people to help us serve Him. Thank God for the people who help and encourage you in your Christian life!

Pharaoh's Pride

Ten Plagues

Water to Blood

The Egyptian people did not worship God. They worshiped many false gods. They worshiped a god of the Nile River, a god who had a head like a frog, and many others. In each of the ten plagues, God showed the Egyptians that their gods were false and that He was the only true God.

The first plague that God brought on Egypt was water turning to blood. God told Moses and Aaron to hit the water of the Nile River with a walking stick. When they did that, the water changed to blood. God also told them to hold the walking stick over the rivers, canals, lakes and every place where water was stored. When Moses and Aaron did that, the water in those places also turned to blood.

Can you imagine how terrible that was? But that was only part of the problem. Exodus 7:21 tells us what happened next. "The fish in the river died, and the river began to stink. So the Egyptians could not drink the water from the river. The blood was everywhere." The smell must have been awful! But Pharaoh's pride and stubbornness kept him from seeing God's power. He refused to free the Israelites.

Take time today to notice God's power in the world through a sunrise, a rainstorm, a beautiful flower or an eagle soaring in the sky.

Frogs

Seven days later, Moses and Aaron went to Pharaoh again. They asked Pharaoh to let the Israelites leave Egypt. But again, Pharaoh refused. So God caused a plague of frogs to happen in Egypt. In Exodus 8:3, God told Moses about this plague. "The Nile River will be filled with frogs. They will come from the river and enter your houses. They will be in your bedrooms and in your beds. They will be in the houses of your officials and in your ovens and in your jars of water."

Maybe you live in the city where you don't see many frogs. But think about having frogs everywhere — outside your house and inside your house. Imagine opening a container of water and finding frogs inside. That would be awful!

Finally, Moses and Aaron prayed and asked God to remove the plague of frogs. God stopped the frogs from coming out of the rivers. But then all the frogs died and began to rot and stink. After the first plague, Egypt had dead fish everywhere. And after this plague, they had dead frogs everywhere! But again, Pharaoh was stubborn and refused to free the Israelites.

Sometimes we can be stubborn and refuse to follow God. Examine your life today and find those areas where you are refusing to obey God. Change your heart and follow Him!

Lice

But God was not finished with Pharaoh yet! He sent a third plague on Egypt. God told Moses and Aaron what to do. Exodus 8:17 tells what happened. "They did this. Aaron raised his hand and hit the dust on the ground, and everywhere in Egypt the dust became lice. The lice got on the animals and the people."

Many Bible scholars are not sure of the meaning of the Hebrew word in verse 17 that describes these insects. Some think it means lice. Others think it means gnats or fleas. So we don't know for sure what kind of insects they were. Can you imagine having lice or gnats or fleas everywhere around you? That was another terrible plague!

And one more thing probably made this plague even more terrible. Small insects like lice, fleas and gnats are often eaten by frogs. Frogs help control the insect population. But all the frogs were dead, so they couldn't eat the insects. Those insects were everywhere!

God was powerful then, and He is still powerful today. God controls everything in nature. And He has made a wonderful balance so that one kind of insect or animal doesn't grow and fill the earth. Thank God today for His plan for a balanced and orderly world.

Flies

Pharaoh still refused to obey, so God sent another plague. This was a plague of flies. Exodus 8:24 explains what happened. "So the Lord did just what he said. Millions of flies came into Egypt. The flies were in Pharaoh's house, and they were in all his officials' houses. They were all over Egypt. The flies were ruining the country." But God did not allow the flies to go where the Israelites lived.

People who live near cattle feed lots often have a problem with flies during the summer. The flies come into their houses. They fly around their heads and some even bite them. It can be a bad experience. I wouldn't want to have "millions of flies" around me!

God removed the flies, but Pharaoh still refused to free the Israelites. After all these bad things happened, I would think Pharaoh would want to get rid of the Israelites and the plagues. But he kept on being stubborn. Because of Pharaoh's stubbornness, God had more opportunities to show His power over people and nature.

Maybe you are facing some bad situations. God can take those bad situations and use them to show other people His power, love and mercy. Ask God to help you be a witness for Him today.

Animal Disease

The fifth plague that God sent was against animals. God told Moses that He would use His power to cause all the horses, donkeys, camels, cattle and sheep to get sick with a terrible disease. Exodus 9:6 tells us that this really happened. "The next morning the Lord did what he said. All the farm animals of the Egyptians died, but none of the animals that belonged to the Israelites died." The Egyptians depended on their animals for food, clothing and transportation and to help with their work.

This plague was like the plague of flies. Only animals that belonged to the Egyptians were affected by the disease. The Israelites' animals were not harmed. Pharaoh even sent his people to see if the Israelites' animals died. God clearly showed His power by just punishing the Egyptian people. But still Pharaoh refused to let the Israelites go free.

God works in our lives in wonderful ways every day. But sometimes we are like Pharaoh — we refuse to acknowledge that God is powerful and working in us. We may take His blessings for granted, or we may just be too busy to stop and think about the ways God helps us every day. God will bless you today. When you see His blessings, thank Him!

Boils

The next plague attacked both animals and people. God told Moses and Aaron that there would be a plague of sores or boils. Exodus 9:10 tells us what Moses and Aaron did. "So Moses and Aaron took ashes from the furnace and went and stood before Pharaoh. Moses threw the ashes into the air, and the sores began breaking out on people and animals."

Sometimes when a plague happened, Pharaoh's magicians were able to make the same things happen. But the Bible tells us that when this plague happened, the magicians couldn't stop Moses because they had boils, too!

We may cut our finger, and it becomes infected. It hurts, and we think about the hurt from that cut all day. How would it feel if your body was covered with painful sores? That must have been really terrible! Even the animals that survived the last plague were covered with sores.

The Bible doesn't tell us that Pharaoh had sores on his body, but he probably did. Maybe he was in a lot of pain. But Pharaoh was still stubborn and refused to pay attention to Moses and Aaron.

Sometimes God allows us to have physical problems so we will realize that we need to depend on Him.

Depend on God and His Word today!

Hail

With the next plague, God said that He would use His full power against Pharaoh, his officials and his people. God wanted the Egyptians to know that there was no other god like Him. God sent a plague of hail, with lightning and thunder.

God warned the Egyptians about this plague and told them to put their animals in safe places. Some Egyptians paid attention, but others ignored the warning and lost everything. Exodus 9:24-25 tells us about this terrible plague. "The hail was falling, and lightning was flashing all through it. It was the worst hailstorm that had ever hit Egypt since it had become a nation. The storm destroyed everything in the fields in Egypt. The hail destroyed people, animals, and plants. The hail also broke all the trees in the field."

I have seen places that have been hit by hailstorms. Roofs, siding and windows of buildings were destroyed, cornstalks were cut in half and plants and trees were completely stripped of their leaves. This hailstorm was a terrible event for the nation of Egypt.

This time Pharaoh told Moses that he had sinned and that God was right. But when Pharaoh saw that the hail stopped, he became stubborn again. I hope you will not be stubborn with God today. Obey Him and follow His Word.

Locusts

The eighth plague was a plague of locusts. In Exodus 10:5 we read what Moses told Pharaoh about this plague. The locusts will cover the land. There will be so many locusts that you will not be able to see the ground. Anything that was left from the hailstorm will be eaten by the locusts. The locusts will eat all the leaves from every tree in the field."

God caused a strong wind to blow all day and night from the east. By the next morning, the wind had brought locusts to Egypt. There were so many locusts flying that the sky became dark. There were no leaves left on any trees or plants in Egypt. These locusts were probably similar to grasshoppers today, but larger and more destructive. Wow! That must have been terrible to experience all those locusts!

Think about all the terrible things that God brought on Egypt — water changing to blood, frogs, lice, flies, animal disease, boils and hail. All of these things worked together to destroy the land and crops in Egypt. By this time, Pharaoh should have been ready to be humble and ask for God's help. Instead, he continued to be stubborn and ignore God.

There are many people in the world who are like Pharaoh. They refuse to acknowledge God as the one true God. Pray for these people today!

Darkness

Have you ever been in a cave where there was no light at all? Maybe you thought that it was so dark you could actually feel the darkness. That's how dark it was in Egypt when God sent the ninth plague. Exodus 10:22-23 describes this plague. "So Moses raised his hands into the air and a cloud of darkness covered Egypt. The darkness stayed in Egypt for three days. None of the people could see each other, and no one got up to go any place for three days. But there was light in all the places where the Israelites lived."

The ten plagues attacked the Egyptian people's beliefs in their gods and showed that their gods were false. That is especially true with the plague of darkness. One of the most important Egyptian gods was Ra, the sun god. This god was a symbol of Pharaoh and his power. So the plague of darkness was an attack against this god and against Pharaoh.

When the plague was over, Pharaoh again told Moses that he would not free the Israelite slaves. He also told Moses that he never wanted him to come to him again. This led God to bring one last terrible plague on Pharaoh and the Egyptian people.

The plagues showed the Egyptians that their gods were false. In the same way, the Bible shows us our sins. Read the Bible and pay attention to it today!

Death of Firstborn

God told Moses that after one more plague, Pharaoh would force the Israelites to leave Egypt. Moses described this last plague in Exodus 11:4-6. "Moses said to the king, "The Lord says, "At midnight tonight, I will go through Egypt, and every firstborn son in Egypt will die, from the firstborn son of Pharaoh, the ruler of Egypt, to the firstborn son of the slave girl grinding grain. Even the firstborn animals will die. The crying in Egypt will be worse than at any time in the past or any time in the future.""

At midnight, God killed all the firstborn sons and firstborn animals in Egypt. That night someone died in every house in Egypt. But God loved the Israelites. He made a way for them to escape the terrible plague. The firstborn sons in the Israelite homes were saved. Finally, the ten plagues were over. Pharaoh told Moses and Aaron to take all the Israelites and their animals and leave Egypt. God was with Moses and Aaron and helped them lead the people to a new home.

The punishment for our sins is eternal separation from God. But just as God made a way for the Israelites to escape the plague of death, He has made a way for us to escape His punishment. That way is through His Son, Jesus. I hope you are obeying and following Him today!

Paul explains why he didn't give up in 2 Corinthians, chapter 4. First, Paul didn't give up because he was trying to please God, not people. Second, Paul was encouraged that Jesus was living and working in him. And third, Paul was sure that all the suffering was nothing compared to the glory of living forever with God. Paul summed this up in 2 Corinthians 4:17. "We have small troubles for a while now, but these troubles are helping us gain an eternal glory. That eternal glory is much greater than our troubles."

We may suffer persecution as we tell others about Jesus. We may not be beaten or thrown in prison like Paul, but some people may make fun of us or turn away from us if we follow Jesus. We can be encouraged by knowing that God will be with us to help us and protect us.

Stand strong for God and His Word today. And remember that God's eternal glory is much greater than your troubles!

Commandments (1)

The Ten Commandments are laws that God gave to the Israelites. We can read these rules in Exodus, chapter 20, and again in Deuteronomy, chapter 5. The Ten Commandments were written on pieces of stone by God Himself. God told the Israelites to save the Ten Commandments and keep them in the Box of Agreement to help remind them that He was always with them.

Some people call the Ten Commandments "God's rules of common sense." The first four commandments talk about our relationship with God. The next six commandments talk about our relationships with other people.

Exodus 19:10-11 tells us that God told Moses to prepare the people to receive these special laws. "And the Lord said to Moses, Today and tomorrow you must prepare the people for a special meeting. They must wash their clothes and be ready for me on the third day. On the third day, the Lord will come down to Mount Sinai. And all the people will see me."

We will look at the Ten Commandments over the next few days. As we study these laws together, pray that God will show you how you can have a good relationship with Him and with other people.

Commandments (2)

Today we will talk about the first two commandments. Both of these laws teach us about how we should worship God. These two commandments are found in Exodus 20:3-4. God said, "You must not worship any other gods except me. You must not make any idols. Don't make any statues or pictures of anything up in the sky or of anything on the earth or of anything down in the water."

God said in the first commandment that we should not worship any other gods. Many people around the world worship other gods. Usually these people bow down to a statue or a picture of their god. But anything that we think is more important than God can become a "god" to us. Maybe we worship our house, our car or our family. Those things can become our gods.

In the second commandment, God said that we should not make any idols. We should not worship any man-made statue or picture. But we can worship God in many ways — praying, singing, fellowshiping, and reading the Bible.

Why did God make these laws? Because He wants people to worship only Him. And God has promised to bless people who worship Him. Worship and serve the one true God today!

Commandments (3)

The third commandment is about God's name. This commandment is found in Exodus 20:7. "You must not use the name of the Lord your God to make empty promises. Whatever you call this, it means showing disrespect for God's name.

Commandments (4)

God's fourth law is about the Sabbath Day. The Sabbath Day was a special day of rest and worship for the Jews. The Sabbath Day is the seventh day of the week (Saturday). We can find this commandment in Exodus 20:10. "But the seventh day is a day of rest in honor of the Lord your God. So on that day no one should work — not you, your sons and daughters, or your men and women slaves. Even your animals and the foreigners living in your cities must not work!"

This commandment is based on how God made the world. God worked six days to create the world. On the seventh day, God rested. God made the Sabbath Day a very special day of rest and worship for His people.

Most Christians around the world do not celebrate the Sabbath Day as a special day of worship. Instead, they worship on Sunday, the first day of the week. It is good for all Christians to have a day when they worship with other Christians. When we worship God and fellowship with other Christians, we receive strength to help us through the week. Also, our bodies need rest. We can be healthier by taking time to rest and relax.

Thank God for creating the world around you. Remember to take time each week to rest from your work and worship Him.

Commandments (5)

The fifth commandment is found in Exodus 20:12. This commandment begins a section where God gives us laws about our relationships with other people. This commandment is about parents and children. Commandments (6)

The next commandment is about murder. We read this law in Exodus 20:13. "You must not murder anyone." This seems easy to understand. Murder means a killing that is against the law. Maybe I am very angry with someone. I am so angry, that I want them to die. So I kill them. That is murder.

Some people, however, wonder if murder means killing people in war or killing people because of crimes they have done. Reading the Bible can help us understand more about this. When the Israelites came into their new land, God told them that He did not want them to live with people who did not follow Him. So, when the Israelites went into Jericho, God told them to kill all the people except for Rahab and her family. Killing the people in Jericho was not murder.

God gave the Israelites the Ten Commandments. He also gave them many other laws. Some of these laws said that the punishment for certain crimes is death. For example, if an Israelite worshiped a false god, he was to be stoned to death. This is also not murder.

God hates murder. That is why He gave the Israelites a commandment about it. Imagine what our world would be like today if all people obeyed this command!

Commandments (7)

Ask God to help you avoid situations where you may be tempted to sin. Read God's Word and fill your mind with pure thoughts today!

Commandments (8)

Today we will learn about the eighth and ninth commandments. We can read these commandments in Exodus 20:15-16. "You must not steal anything. You must not tell lies about other people."

These two commandments seem very simple. Many people, however, think that these laws mean "do not steal anything that is *valuable*" and "do not tell *big* lies." Let's look closely at these commandments and see what they mean.

God did not say that it is okay to steal a piece of gum from the grocery store. God did not say that it is okay to steal paper and pencils from the office where you work. Many people think that stealing these things is okay because they are not valuable. God made it clear — stealing is a sin. Stealing a penny is just as bad as stealing \$1,000,000!

Some people believe that lies can be divided into two groups — little lies and big lies. All lies are the same to God. If you lie about why you arrived at work late, it is the same as lying to the government on your income tax return. A lie is a sin, no matter how big or little you think it is.

God loves you and wants you to obey His laws. Ask Him to help you get rid of sin in your life.

Commandments (9)

The tenth law that God gave to His people is about wanting things that belong to another person. Exodus 20:17 tells us this last commandment. "You must not want to take your neighbor's house. We should not want the things that belong to someone else. This commandment is about having an attitude of satisfaction. If we are satisfied with what we have, we will not want what belongs to another person.

Instead of being dissatisfied, you should be thankful that your home is warm in the winter. You should be thankful that your car takes you to work every day. What about you? Are you always wanting the things that your friends have? God can help you be satisfied and thankful for what you have.

Commandments (10)

God gave the Ten Commandments to the Israelites to help them. God wanted them to be happy and satisfied. But when the Israelites did not obey these laws, they were not happy. God knows that if we obey His commandments, we will be happy. Remember that God always knows what is best for His children!

Holy Tent (1)

God promised the Israelites He would free them from slavery in Egypt, be their God and bring them to a new land. That is what the book of Exodus is about. Chapters 1-18 tell us how God freed the Israelites from slavery. In chapters 19-24, God makes the Israelites His special people and gives them His laws. Finally, in chapters 25-40, God commands the Israelites to build a Holy Tent where He could come and live among them.

Exodus 24:16 tells us what happened when Moses met with God on the mountain. "The Glory of the Lord came down on Mount Sinai. The cloud covered the mountain for six days. On the seventh day, the Lord spoke to Moses from the cloud." God's glory is the way that He appeared to Moses. And God needed a place where His glory could live among the Israelites. So He told Moses to build a Holy Tent.

The Holy Tent was a movable meeting place where God could fellowship and communicate with His people. The Holy Tent is sometimes called the Tabernacle or the Tent of Meeting. For the next nine days we will look at God's plan for the Holy Tent and its furnishings.

God has always provided a way for people to be close to Him. He loves you and wants you to be close to Him today.

Holy Tent (2)

God gave Moses specific instructions on how to build the Holy Tent. In Exodus 25:8-9 we can read what God told Moses. "The people will build a holy place for me. Then I can live among them. I will show you what the Holy Tent and everything in it should look like. Build everything exactly as I show you."

The Holy Tent was made from very expensive materials — gold, silver, bronze, special woods and fine cloths. Today those materials would cost millions of dollars! Moses gathered the materials by simply asking the Israelite people to give. They were very willing to give. In fact, the people gave so much that later Moses had to tell them to stop giving!

The Holy Tent and its courtyard were in the center of where the Israelites camped. The twelve tribes of Israel camped around this courtyard each time they stopped. Inside the courtyard was a structure that was divided into the Holy Place and the Most Holy Place. Soon we will learn about the furnishings in these places.

God's plan for the Holy Tent was perfect. God has a plan for your life, too. Give Him your life and serve Him today!

Holy Tent (3)

The first piece of furniture in the courtyard of the Holy Tent was the altar for burnt offerings. It was made from acacia wood and covered with bronze. This altar was the most-used piece of furniture in the Holy Tent. The priests used this altar every day to offer sacrifices to God.

God gave Moses the exact plan for building the altar. Exodus 27:6-7 tells us that God even provided a way to carry the altar. "Use acacia wood to make poles for the altar, and cover them with bronze. Put the poles through the rings on both sides of the altar. Use these poles for carrying the altar."

God wanted to be near the Israelites. But first, the people had to have their sins forgiven. So God required the Israelites to bring animals to be sacrificed on the altar for burnt offerings. Only a perfect animal was good enough to be sacrificed there. God accepted the animal sacrifices as a way to forgive the sins of the people.

When Jesus died on the cross, His sacrifice covered all sins — past, present and future. After Jesus died, no animal sacrifices were needed. Jesus is our perfect sacrifice. When we follow and obey Him, His blood forgives our sins and keeps us close to God.

Holy Tent (4)

Another piece of furniture in the courtyard of the Holy Tent was the washing bowl. This was the place where the Israelite priests washed their hands and feet. Exodus 30:20 tells us about this. "Every time they enter the Meeting Tent, they must wash with that water so that they will not die. They must also wash every time they come near the altar to burn incense or to offer gifts to the Lord."

The washing bowl was made of bronze and covered with bronze mirrors. Perhaps the priests used these mirrors to make sure they were clean. The washing bowl was placed between the altar of burnt offerings and the entrance to the Holy Place.

The Israelite priests needed to have their bodies clean when they came before God. In the same way, we need to be clean before we can be close to God. Being clean before God means having our sins forgiven. The only way to have our sins forgiven is through Jesus. When our sins are forgiven, we can have a right relationship with God.

Thank God today for His plan of salvation and forgiveness through His Son, Jesus.

Holy Tent (5)

The first item of furniture in the Holy Place was the lampstand. Exodus 25:31 describes how the lampstand was made. "Then you must make a lampstand. Use pure gold and hammer it to make the base and the shaft. Make flowers, buds, and petals from pure gold. Join all these things together into one piece."

The lampstand must have been very beautiful! It was decorated with flowers that looked like almond flowers. The lampstand was to give light for the Holy Place.

Sometimes people call this lampstand a golden candlestick. But really it was a stand that held seven oil lamps. Olive oil was burned in these lamps. It was the job of the priests to trim the wicks in the lamps, fill them with oil and keep them lit at all times.

Light is mentioned many times in the New Testament, too. Jesus called Himself the "light of the world." And He said that Christians should be "light" in the dark world of sin.

God wants every Christian to be a "light" for other people. We can do this when we share the Good News about Jesus and when we show God's love and goodness to people that we meet each day. Be a "light" for Jesus today!

Holy Tent (6)

Another piece of furniture in the Holy Place was a table. This table was made from acacia wood and covered in pure gold. The plates, spoons, pitchers and bowls that were used on this table were also made of gold.

Exodus 25:30 tells us how this table was used. "Put the special bread before me on the table. It must always be there in front of me." The priests placed twelve loaves of bread on this table. These loaves represented the twelve tribes of Israel. The priests who served in the Holy Place ate this bread. Every Sabbath day (Saturday), the priests removed any leftover bread and put out new bread.

The bread on this special table reminded the Israelites that God always took care of them. After they left Egypt, God fed them for many years with manna. God provided for His people. They always had enough to eat.

Jesus called Himself "the bread that gives life." Just as we need to eat bread and other foods to stay alive, we need Jesus to stay alive spiritually. You need Jesus today. Learn about Him and His plan of salvation from God's Word, the Bible. And thank Jesus for making a way so you can live forever with Him!

Holy Tent (7)

The last piece of furniture in the Holy Place was the altar of incense. It was also made from acacia wood and covered with gold. The altar was set outside the curtain that separated the Holy Place from the Most Holy Place.

Exodus 30:7 tells us what Aaron, the High Priest, had to do with the altar of incense. "Aaron must burn sweet-smelling incense on the altar every morning. He will do this when he comes to care for the lamps."

This incense was a special mixture. Nothing else could be burned on this altar. When this special incense burned, its sweet-smelling smoke was pleasing to God.

In the book of Revelation, John tells us that burning incense represents the prayers of God's people. God wants us to pray to Him. He wants us to praise Him and tell Him our needs. Our prayers are pleasing to God, just like the incense burned in the Holy Tent.

Holy Tent (8)

A curtain in the Holy Tent separated the Holy Place from the Most Holy Place. This curtain was made from heavy woven cloth. Exodus 26:31 describes this curtain. "Use fine linen and make a special curtain for the inside of the Holy Tent. Use blue, purple, and red yarn and sew pictures of Cherub angels into the curtain."

Once a year, the High Priest went through the curtain into the Most High Place. He sprinkled blood on the Box of the Agreement. This is how the Israelite nation had their sins forgiven.

This curtain represented the separation between God and His people. God hates sin, and He cannot be close to people whose sins have not been forgiven. When Jesus died on the cross, the curtain in the Temple in Jerusalem was torn into two pieces. This showed that because of Jesus' death, people didn't have to be separated from God any more.

I hope you are close to God. Have you made the decision to follow Jesus by repenting of your sins, confessing His name and being baptized? If not, be sure to read His Word and obey it today. Then you can be close to God!

Holy Tent (9)

The most important furnishing in the Holy Tent was the Box of the Agreement. Like other furniture in the Holy Tent, it was made of acacia wood and covered with gold.

The Box of the Agreement had a lid called the mercy-cover. Exodus 25:19 tells us that there were angels on the mercy-cover. "Put one angel on one end of the mercy-cover, and put the other angel on the other end. Join the angels together with the mercy-cover to make one piece."

Hebrews 9:4 lists the things that were put inside the Box of the Agreement: a jar of manna, Aaron's rod and the Ten Commandments. These three things reminded the Israelites that God provided for them, that He was powerful and that He protected them every day.

Once a year the High Priest sprinkled blood on the Box of the Agreement. That was how the Israelites had their sins forgiven. Many years later, Jesus came to earth and died on the cross. Then He became the only way that we can have our sins forgiven.

Jesus is the only way to God and forgiveness. Follow Him today!

Holy Tent (10)

No More Manna
